

Registration

There are two ways to register for the Fall 2024 Semester.

Online Classes: A student must register online at www.labts.org for online classes. Several methods of payments are available.

In-person Classes: The registration for in-person classes can be done online at www.labts.org. This is highly recommended. An alternative is to register on the first day of the in-person class. Registration will also be held one hour prior to the start of the first day of class. Methods of payments that will be accepted are cash, check, and debit/credit card.

Costs: The registration fee is \$100.00 per course. The fee is non-refundable unless the course is cancelled. There is an additional cost for the textbook assigned for each class. The textbook for online classes must be purchased as a part of registration. Students who are taking an in-person class will purchase their textbook on the first day of class.
